Petunia's Frozen Fruit Cups



What you need:

Jello molds or ice cube tray

Fresh fruit

Water

Coconut water

Knife for cutting fruit

Directions:

- Cut up fruits into tiny pieces
- Place fruit chunks in mold or tray
- Fill mold/ tray with Coconut Water
- Stick in Freezer and wait until frozen

Notes:

For bigger longer lasting frozen treats use a larger mold

Add more flavor with flavored Coconut Water

Add food coloring for flare

These are great for hot Summer days and keeping pigs busy. Recommend using outside or in a dish. Food coloring or fruit may stain carpets.

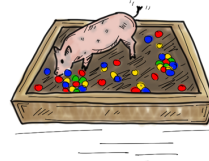

DID YOU KNOW?



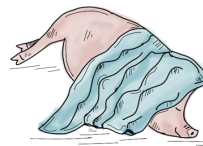
Rooting boxes can help a bored pig from becoming destructive. Some pigs will simply root around in the designated area and other pigs prefer there to be treats scattered around in there. Be sure that nothing used is small enough to be swallowed.



You may go through a lot of different items before finding a few your pig truly enjoys. Rotate through toys every month so your pig doesn't become complacent with the items you use for enrichment.



Pigs actually seem to enjoy painting. As you attempt to paint with your piggie take these into consideration. 1st, painting is SUPER messy. Take the necessary precautions to prep your space. Make sure you are using water based NON-TOXIC paints) and use with flat canvas boards/panels.



If a pig gets overheated, it's best to aim for a gradual cool down rather than an abrupt immersion in ice or cold water. Use cool, but not cold cloths on head, neck and abdomen. You can dampen then tie/wrap the cooling towel from your box around your piggy for regulated cooling.
